Since WLT enjoys 501 (c) 3 status donations to it are deductible under IRS rules, a feature which sometimes proves attractive! Our work is supported by dues, donations, grants and a very modest endowment income. Members enjoy an annual potluck supper, generally in the fall.

Join Us for a Regional Conservation Conversation

The Wyndham Land Trust will host an informal discussion and short hike for State legislators, community leaders, and other land trusts in northeastern Connecticut at Bull Hill Preserve on Thursday, July 12. The event is sponsored by the Connecticut Land Conservation Council (CLCC) to celebrate projects made possible in part by DEEP's Open Space & Watershed Land Acquisition (OSWA) grant program, funded by the Community Investment Act.

Early History by Ben Williams and George Jackson

In 1975 a group of like-minded souls gathered in the home of Virginia W. (Jimmy) and Bob Booth in Brooklyn, CT. Also in attendance were John Bigalow, George Jackson, Phil James, and Lois Orswell; all Pomfret residents. During the gathering Jimmy asked, "Why don't we form a land trust?"

That group became the first Board of Directors of the Wyndham Land Trust.

Although interest in open-space preservation was the motivating factor in establishing the land trust, the organization was not proactive in the early years. The first property, the 29-acre Chaffee Preserve in Putnam, Connecticut was donated to the land trust in 1977. Other donations followed and the membership began to grow at a modest rate.

Phil James served as President for the early years until his death in 2001. Phil was succeeded by Richard W. (Dick) Booth, who served as President until 2011. Dick Booth's commitment to the land trust was unprecedented and unmatched. Under Dick's leadership, driven by his scientific curiosity and his sheer dedication, the Land Trust experienced its initial growth surge in terms of both membership and land under protection. In 2005, 30 years after the first meeting in Brooklyn, Dick presided over a party celebrating ownership of our first 1000 acres of land.

George Jackson is the only surviving member of the group that met in 1975. George is still a contributing board member, and we value his wisdom and experience; he served as the Treasurer for many years and is now the Secretary of the land trust.

Bull Hill Preserve

The land trust continues to acquire land on Bull Hill in Thompson in an effort to protect this large, unbroken forested lot from development. We now own 771 acres on Bull Hill, including a few properties across the town line in Woodstock, a remarkable achievement by the Board of Directors in just 18 months.

An Eagle Scout project is developing a blazed trail system that will lead visitors to the dramatic overlook point. Once the trail markers are in place, we will encourage members to visit and enjoy the scenic vistas.

In the meantime we continue to host guided walks on the property, including a joint Connecticut Trails Day/Last Green Valley Spring Outdoors event on June 2 and Walktober events in the fall. In addition, Andy Rzeznikiewicz has led several Connecticut Audubon birdwatching trips onto the property in search of hard-to-find migrants.

David Ostrowski and Karen Durlach, residents of Thompson, recently donated 10 acres on Bull Hill to the land trust. Ostrowski, who had owned the property for over 30 years, stipulated that it be preserved as a bird sanctuary and wildlife habitat and that the parcel be called Avian Haven Wildlife Preserve.

"We appreciate nature's wildlife: fur, feathers, leaves, and mushrooms," explained Ostrowski "both above and below ground. It brings satisfaction when you're in contact with nature. It's hard to describe, but you need that contact to be healthy. Nature has given us a lot, and I wanted to give something back by preserving this property forever.

"We have been stewards for the land trust for many years, and when we heard of the Bull Hill project we felt it was a perfect fit for preservation. We hope that the land trust continues to protect more of Bull Hill, one or two steps at a time."




Stewards Meeting
