Its emphasis is on wildlife habitat, especially where unique or particularly fragile assemblages of animals and plants exist or may be expected to exist. Its properties are open to the public for the quiet enjoyment of nature. Land may be acquired by donation or purchase. Since WLT enjoys 501 (c) 3 status donations to it are deductible under IRS rules, a feature which sometimes proves attractive! Our work is supported by dues, donations, grants and a very modest endowment income. Members enjoy an annual potluck supper, generally in the fall.



Denise has a BS from Northeastern and an MBA from Saint Louis University. She worked as a financial analyst at Day





It will take just a wee amount of your time—an hour at best—and you can come late or leave early. Science proves the power of fresh air! Heck, you can even sit in your car and simply enjoy the views, smells, sounds if that is better for you."

## CLCC Event

On the evening of Thursday, July 12 the land trust hosted a Connecticut Land Conservation Council (CLCC) Regional Conservation Conversation on our Bull Hill preserve. The event was one of many statewide events that highlighted Connecticut land conservation success stories made possible by the DEEP's Open Space & Watershed Land Acquisition Program (OSWA) - funded by the Community Investment Act - and other local investments. The land trust received \$172,000 from the program, and we used the money towards the purchase of the initial 254 acres on Bull Hill that kickstarted the project.

Local community leaders, land trust members, and guests were invited, and it was a great opportunity to showcase the work we are doing to protect Bull Hill. The event was one of the best attended Regional Conservation Conversations in Connecticut. It was a magical summer evening, and it was heartening to hear appreciation for all the work we are doing.

## THE GROWTH CONTINUES

The Wyndham Land Trust continues to grow at an unprecedented rate and shows no sign of slowing down. Since the summer newsletter we acquired three more properties on Bull Hill, adding 113 acres to the project. In just two years we have secured 885 acres on Bull Hill, in both Thompson and Woodstock, with help from member donations, the Summer Hill Foundation, the Bafflin Foundation, and the CT DEEP's Open Space & Watershed Land Acquisition Program (OSWA).

In addition to Bull Hill, we added a 24-acre parcel on the northwest corner of Long Pond in Thompson, which strengthens our protection of this ecologically valuable wetland. We also added 27 acres adjacent to our Robbins property in Thompson. The additions to both the Long Pond and Robbins Preserves help protect the water quality in the Five-Mile River as it heads south towards the Quaddick Reservoir and our Lower Pond Preserve. One of the long-term goals of the land trust is to protect the Five Mile River.

It was only a few years ago (2006) that the land trust hosted a party at Tyrone Farms in Pomfret celebrating the acquisition of our first 1000 acres. It took us over 30 years to reach that milestone. Today, just 12 years later, we have approximately 4000 acres under protection.
